For the September 21, 2021 COVID-19 positive test report, we have one new Nursing Facility resident test positive for COVID-19 and we have not had three or more residents or staff with new onset of respiratory symptoms occurring within 72 hours of each other. As a result, we have immediately begun outbreak testing and have suspended all visitation (except that required under federal disability rights law), until at least one round of facility-wide testing is completed. One other resident living on the same Villa as this positive nursing facility resident reported yesterday was tested and found to be positive for COVID-19 at the hospital. This is the added positive case we are reporting on today. We are continuing to test the remaining nursing facility residents, staff and anyone else that may have had a Close contact with this resident as per CMS (Centers of Medicare and Medicaid Services) guidance. "Close contact" refers to someone who has been within 6 feet of a COVID-19 positive person for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period.

We have completed one round of testing all Nursing Facility residents and those Personal Care residents who potentially could have been exposed and have found all of these residents to be negative for COVID-19.

Therefore, cumulatively to date since March 2020 we have a total of:

We continue to take the necessary Core Principles of COVID-19 Infection Prevention as per the Pennsylvania Department of Health and Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) guidance. These Core Principles include:

• Screening of all who enter the facility for signs and symptoms of COVID-19 (e.g., temperature checks, questions about and observations of signs or symptoms), and denial of entry of those with signs or symptoms or those who have had close contact with someone with COVID-19 infection in the prior 14 days (regardless of the visitor's vaccination status)

• Hand hygiene (use of alcohol-based hand rub is preferred)

• Face covering or mask (covering mouth and nose) and social distancing at least six feet between persons, in accordance with CDC guidance

• Instructional signage throughout the facility and proper visitor education on COVID-19 signs and symptoms, infection control precautions, other applicable facility practices (e.g., use of face covering or mask, specified entries, exits and routes to designated areas, hand hygiene)

• Cleaning and disinfecting high-frequency touched surfaces in the facility often, and designated visitation areas after each visit

- Appropriate staff use of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)
- Effective cohorting of residents (e.g., separate areas dedicated to COVID-19 care)
- Resident and staff testing conducted as required

Per current CMS recommendations we will have to stop indoor visits until at least one round of facility-wide testing is completed. Consistent with CMS rules, all staff and residents that tested negative will be retested every 3 days to 7 days until testing identifies no new cases of COVID-19 infection among staff or residents for a period of at least 14 days since the most recent positive result.

Per CMS guidance visitation can resume based on the following criteria:

• If the first round of outbreak testing reveals no additional COVID-19 cases in other areas (e.g., units or villas) of the facility, then indoor visitation can resume for residents in areas/units with no COVID-19 cases. However, the facility should suspend visitation on the affected unit until the facility meets the criteria to discontinue outbreak testing.

o For example, if the first round of outbreak testing reveals two more COVID-19 cases in the same unit as the original case, but not in other units, indoor visitation can resume for residents in areas/units with no COVID-19 cases.

• If the first round of outbreak testing reveals one or more additional COVID-19 cases in other areas/units/villas of the facility (e.g., new cases in two or more units), then facilities should suspend visitation for all residents (vaccinated and unvaccinated), until the facility meets the criteria to discontinue outbreak testing.
